Now a showroom for their collection of unusual antiques, the house made a perfect setting for our first event of the year.

A few weeks later we were entertained and enlightened by William H. Bates III of the American College of the Building Arts in Charleston. This brand-new school is dedicated to passing along centuries-old techniques of masonry, plaster work, iron mongery, and other architectural crafts to future generations. The faculty is drawn from an international group of masters, and students will graduate with a four-year degree in building arts. We were surprised and delighted to hear about the fledgling enterprise and look forward to a return engagement from Mr. Bates. We were given a warm welcome at the Collectors Club on 35th Street, a historic building designed by Stanford White and a lovely place to hear a lecture and sip a glass of wine.






Historic Ridgefield, Connecticut, is considered a fine example of Colonial-era town planning. Twenty families living on the Connecticut coast purchased twenty thousand acres from the local Indians for £100 in 1708. The area has three prominent ridges, the middle of which constitutes the town's main street. A stroll down the main street of Ridgefield today is a dream come true for early domestic architecture buffs.

We will visit private houses, including a 1735 farmhouse and a fine Georgian revival house built in 1933. Also on the program is the Keeler Tavern, an inn built in the 1750s and restored by architect Cass Gilbert, and lunch at the delightful Elms Inn, a historic tavern in continuous operation since Colonial times. In the mid nineteenth century the railroad brought wealthy New Yorkers to Ridgefield for weekends and summers and the town still features outstanding examples of American domestic architecture from many periods that we will see on our wonderful tour.

Space on this trip is limited and reservations will be honored in the order in which they are received. We must receive your reservation and payment by May 10.

Exclusive two-day trip to the Cooperstown, New York, area, Hyde Hall, and the Glimmerglass Opera Wednesday, July 26-Thursday, July 27, 2006

We are pleased to offer this event-filled trip to Cooperstown, New York. Our distinguished guest will be AFGG honorary patron, Sir Philip Thomas, Consul General of Great Britain. We will tour the historic Cherry Valley area and have dinner there on Wednesday at Auchinbreck, a private historic house. On Thursday we will visit a number of Federal period and Greek revival houses in Cooperstown, including Lakelands (c.1802-1804), built by John Bowers; Prentiss House (1814), built by John Prentiss; and Edgewater (1810-1812), built by Isaac Cooper. Our tour will culminate at the famous Palladian Hyde Hall. Construction of Hyde Hall was begun in 1817; it is considered the leading example of the domestic work of Philip Hooker, the great architect of Albany and upstate New York. We are indeed fortunate to be invited to a gala dinner

at Hyde Hall honoring Sir Philip. This festive evening will continue with a performance of Gilbert and Sullivan's Pirates of Penzance at the Glimmerglass Opera House, with an intermission cocktail reception

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
