


in the American South.

Space for this event is very limited and is open to AFGG members only.



Tryon Palace: Reinterpreting American Georgian Architecture lecture and reception

Tryon Palace, in New Bern, North Carolina, was designed by English architect John Hawks as the legislative capitol for the colony and the residence of the royal governor. It was built between 1767 and 1770 and was regarded as the finest Georgian-style public building in America. The main building was destroyed by fire in 1798 and the stable is the only part of the original structure that survives today. Tryon Palace was restored in the 1950s, however a letter from Hawks discovered a few years ago gave new information about the architectural trim and several of the rooms. Based on this, the decision was made to re-restore parts of the site to conform as nearly as possible with Hawks's original designs.


Nancy Richards is curator of collections at Tryon Palace; Peter Sandbeck is an architectural historian in charge of the preservation section of the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources. Their talk will cover the history of Tryon Palace and its restoration, as well as other work by John Hawks.

A reception will follow the lecture.




